The Association has decided to set up an award to recognise the

scholarship of members' children and wards.

It is named Wah Yan College Kowloon Scholastic Achievement Award (WYKSAA). It is worth \$100.00 each.

The rules are as follows:

"The Award is open to students whose aggregate total of their best six Ontario Academic Credits gained in 1998 ~ 2000 academic year is 480 or over and who will begin their post-secondary education in September, 2000.

Applicants must

- (1) have attended Wah Yan College Kowloon or
- (2) be the wards/children/grand-children of current paid-up members of WYKAAO.

Application form together with a certified true copy of Ontario Secondary School Transcript should reach the registered office of WYKAAO on or before September 8th, 2000.

Decision of the Selection Committee is final. Successful candidates will be notified in October, 2000."

Your Call

The Basic Laws guarantee Hong Kong to remain unchanged for 50 years. 50 thus becomes a magic number. So, when Mr. Tung Chee Wah was not considered among the 50 most influential leaders in Asia, it became a hot social topic among Hong Kong people. In the last two months, education was the hottest topic among local media, polls of '50 hit schools', '50 quality schools' and '50 value-added schools' were published. The first two were conducted by a commercial web site and the last one was a study carried out by the SAR Education Department. Partial lists are as follows:

'Hit' schools are those that parents try to put their children into. They are the so-called 'prestigious' schools. Their ranking reflects the brand-name effect.

'Quality' schools are ranked according to the total assessment of various components of the schools, such as administration, staff, student extra curricular activities and academic performance. Some schools did not return the questionnaire and thus they were left out in the ranking. The result is claimed to be subjective and helps parents to choose schools.

'Value-Added' school is a term to describe an institution that enhances the 'potentials' of its students. For example, when Band-5 Form 1 students of a certain school out-performs Band-5 results in Form 5 Certificate Examinations, the school is described as value-added. On the other hand, when Band-1 Form 1 students cannot produce Band-1 results in Form 5 CE, the school is not included in the Value-Added list. This is supposed to educate parents not to be biased towards brand-name schools.

Pupils are banded in Primary 6 and they are stamped before they pass on to secondary school. They are divided evenly into 5 Bands. Wah Yan College Kowloon usually receives Band-1 boys.

Both Wah Yan Colleges are not included in the list of the first 50 value-added schools.

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We have read in the last issue of the newsletter how our members view their Alma Mater. We may or may not agree with the findings. However, they do show how the public perceives Wah Yan Colleges and how Wah Yan Colleges are judged.

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Suppose we say Wah Yan Kowloon is, nonetheless, a top school. Is it because of the school or the students? The song or the singer? Your call.
